THE WORLD PREMIERE OF *THE HAMPTON YEARS* TAKES ROOT AT THEATER J'S LOCALLY GROWN FESTIVAL

(Washington, DC)–Theater J continues its second annual Locally Grown: Community Supported Art Festival with *The Hampton Years* (May 29-June 30). This breakthrough premiere explores the development of great African-American artists John Biggers and Samella Lewis under the tutelage of Austrian Jewish refugee painter and educator, Viktor Lowenfeld. Focusing on the pivotal years at Hampton Institute, Virginia during WWII, this richly researched tapestry of African American luminaries like Elizabeth Catlett and Charles White reveals the dreams and travails of young artists in a still segregated society. The piece also examines the impact of World War II on a Jewish immigrant finding shelter in the US, and his controversial influence in shaping the careers of African American students.

The Hampton Years structurally parallels Viktor Lowenfeld's stages of artistic development. As the first movement begins, Austrian refugees Viktor (Sasha Olinick) and his wife Margaret (Sarah Douglas) decide to move to Hampton, Virginia to create an art department at The Hampton Institute, a vocational school for black students. Though the University President has gualms about encouraging black students to become artists, Lowenfeld finds a talented young protégé in the young painter John Biggers (Julian Elijah Martinez). As Biggers's talent develops, so does the art department, bringing in new students like the fiery young Samella Lewis (Crashonda Edwards) and black professors like famed artists Charles White (David Lamont Wilson) and Elizabeth Catlett (Lolita Marie). Amidst the terrors of World War II in Europe and Jim Crow laws in America, the small community of artists share a complex survivors' bond, and a vision of art as a means to "reflect the truth of society whether or not society is ready to face it." In this passionate new play, Lawton creates a world where paintings and sculptures come to life to grapple with their creators, and the quest to make art is as political as it is personal.

The Hampton Years was commissioned and developed by Theater J as part of the Locally Grown: Community Supported Art festival. Speaking on the play's development since the festival, playwright **Jacqueline E. Lawton** remarks "Having this level of investment and commitment at the early stages of the writing process has been invigorating. Since the first reading in January of 2012, *The Hampton Years* has received new play development workshops and readings at the Kennedy Center's Page-to-Stage Festival and also as part of Theater J's Tea@2 Beyond the Stage series. Each time the play has grown in terms of plot and character development. It's been an enriching and rewarding process. I'm appreciative of Theater J for championing local playwrights and for believing in me as a playwright. I can hardly wait to start rehearsals to see the culmination of our efforts come to life on stage."

Jacqueline E. Lawton was named one of 30 of the nation's leading black playwrights by Arena Stage's American Voices New Play Institute. Her plays include: Anna K, Blood-bound and Tongue-tied, Deep Belly Beautiful, The Devil's Sweet Water, Ira Aldridge: the African Roscius, Lions of Industry, Mothers of

Invention, Love Brothers Serenade (2013 semi-finalist for the Eugene O'Neill Theater Center's National Playwrights Conference), Mad Breed and Our Man Beverly Snow. She participated in the Kennedy Center's Playwrights' Intensive

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(2002) and World Interplay (2003). Ms. Lawton is a member of the Dramatist Guild of America and a 2012 TCG Young Leaders of Color award recipient. She is also a National New Play Network (NNPN) Playwright Alumna, a member of the Round House Theatre Artist's Round Table, and a member of Arena Stage's Playwright's Arena.

"It's been wonderful to have a playwright as present as Jacqueline has been through pre-production" says Shirley Serotsky, Associate Artistic Director of Theater J and long-time collaborator of Jacqueline E. Lawton. Ms. Serotsky, who will be directing *The Hampton Years*, remarks, "This play has encouraged me to think about art and identity, and how those two concepts are linked, in really interesting and exciting ways. It's forced me to ask some difficult questions of myself, as an artist within a culturally specific theater...my questions of identity are not automatically the same as [Jacqueline E. Lawton's] questions of identity; and also that these conversations are really important for us to have, even when they're difficult. *Especially* when they're difficult."

The Hampton Years is the fifth full production Shirley Serotsky has directed at Theater J. Her other directing credits at Theater J include the *The History of Invulnerability* (2012); *The Moscows of Nantucket* (2011); *Mikveh* (2010) which received two Helen Hayes Nominations for Best Actress; and *The Rise and Fall of Annie Hall* (2009) which received a Helen Hayes Nomination for Best New Play. Regionally, she has directed a 21/24 Lab Workshop presentation of *The Break* (Signature Theatre); *Working: The Musical* (Keegan Theatre); *Blood Wedding* (Constellation Theatre); *Birds of a Feather* (which won the 2012 Charles MacArthur Helen Hayes Award for Outstanding New Play) and *A Man, a Wife and His Hat* at The Hub Theatre; *Juno and the Paycock* (Washington Shakespeare Company); and a staged reading of *Bengal Tiger at the Baghdad Zoo* for the NEA New Play Development Festival at Arena Stage. She has also directed at Theatre Alliance, the Source Festival, Forum Theatre, Catalyst Theater (where she was a company member), the New York Musical Theatre Festival and the Humana Festival of New Plays. In 2008, she was nominated for the Helen Hayes Award for Outstanding Director for Rorschach Theatre's production of *References to Salvador Dali Make Me Hot*.

Ms. Serotsky leads a talented team of actors. Coming to the production after his autumn appearance in Theater J's Our Class is Sasha Olinick, playing the role of Viktor Lowenfeld, an Austrian professor at Hampton University. Olinick's other recent credits include the role of Mozart in Round House Theatre's production of Amadeus and Hetchman in The Hub Theatre's A Man, His Wife, and His Hat, directed by Shirley Serotsky. Playing Margaret, Viktor's insightful wife, will be Sarah Douglas. A graduate of the American Repertory Theatre Institute for Acting, Ms. Douglas most recently appeared as Lydia in The Hub Theatre's production of Big Love. This performance will be her Theater J debut. Also making their Theater J debuts are Julian Elijah Martinez, David Lamont Wilson, Colin Smith and Edward Christian. Julian Elijah Martinez recently earned praise for his "powerful" (Washington Post) performance as Private Reeves in Forum Theatre's 9 Circles. He is a longtime actor at the Chesapeake Bay Company, where he recently performed in Romeo and Juliet. Other recent credits include Locomotion at The Kennedy Center and Hamlet at the Orlando Shakespeare Theatre. Also a prolific theater sound designer, David Lamont Wilson recently garnered accolades for his acting talent in Factory 449's production of *Magnificent Waste*. Colin Smith comes to Theater J after a busy year at Keegan Theatre, where in addition to performing in The Crucible, 12 Angry Men and August: Osage County (Helen Hayes Award Nomination, Outstanding Ensemble), he also directed Laughter on the 22nd Floor. Edward Christian comes to Theater J after appearing in last season's The Language Archive at Forum Theatre and The Taming of The Shrew at the Folger Theatre. The cast is completed by returning Theater J artists Crashonda Edwards and Lolita Marie. Ms. Edwards will be familiar to Theater J audiences for her sterling performance as Susan in this season's production of Race. Ms. Edwards trained at the Shakespeare Theatre Company's Academy for Classical Acting. There, her remarkable performances as Marianna in All's Well that Ends Well and Castabella in The Atheist's Tragedy established her as a bright young talent. Lolita Marie was last seen by Theater J audiences as Uneeq in Something You Did. She has also appeared in Constellation Theatre's Blood Wedding, directed by Shirley Serotsky.

Creating the pastoral campus of Hampton University will be the design team of Scenic Designer Robbie Hayes (The History of Invulnerability, The Moscows of Nantucket), Lighting Designer Harold F. Burgess, Costume Designer Debra Kim Sivigny (The History of Invulnerability, The Moscows of Nantucket), Sound Designer Matthew Nielson (The History of Invulnerability, The Whipping Man) and Properties Master Timothy Jerome Jones.

The Hampton Years runs May 29–June 30, 2013 at Theater J in the Washington DCJCC's Aaron & Cecile Goldman Theater. Press night is Monday, June 3 at 7:30 pm. Performances on Saturday, June 1 at 8:00 pm and Sunday, June 2 at 7:30 pm are \$30 previews. Performances on Wednesday, May 29, and Thursday, May 30 at 7:30 pm are pay-what-you-can previews. Performances on June 9, 16 and 23 and 30 are \$35 Sunday night specials. There will be a special noon matinee on Friday, June 14, and 3:00 Saturday matinees on June 22 and 29 at 3:00.
