Meanwhile, Theatre J located in Northwest Washington, D.C., will present the world premiere of the play from May 29 to June 30, 2013. The play analyzes the development of great African- American artists John Biggers and Samella Leurs and focuses on their pivotal years at Hampton Institute, Virginia during WWII. This thoroughly researched story of two African Americans reveals the dreams of young artists in a segregated society.

"Working on *The Hampton Years*, at Theater J has been an extraordinary experience. So, really and truly, I feel blessed and excited about everything," said Lawton.

Recently, outside of the District, Lawton had a reading of her new play, Our Man Beverly Snow on Thursday, March 21st a Gettysburg College as part of its New Works Festival. Then, Sunday, March 24, she participated on a panel discussion about gender and race in the American Theater as part of Boston Center for the Arts and Company One's XX Playlab Festival, a showcase of new work by Boston playwrights offering dialogue with the playwrights and several leading artists in the field.
